### ***Lifespan/Brown Criminal Justice Research Program on Substance Use, HIV, and Comorbidities/NIDA (Dr. Curt Beckwith, PI) (2014-2023)***

Brad is Co-investigator on Dr. Beckwith's R25 training grant funded in 2014. The five-year grant (initially funded in 2014 and funded again for five-years in October 2019) is designed to increase the number and capacity of clinical scientists focused on improving treatment outcomes among current and former prisoners. Scholars are competitively selected from post-docs, MDs, and select pre-docs. Brad helps design training modules focused on criminal justice issues and overall health challenges of justice involved individuals, supports recruitment and dissemination efforts, and is a principal liaison with program scholars.

### ***Developing the "Maine Model" of Corrections/Maine Department of Corrections (Brad Brockmann, Co-PI).***

Brad is Co-Principal Investigator with Cyrus Ahalt from UCSF Medical School on this grant to research and document the Maine DOC's shift from a culture of punishment to a culture of wellness in their Maximum Security Prison. This potential national model of care focuses on providing staff, particularly correctional officers, with innovative training to improve both their skills in dealing with incarcerated individuals with mental, behavioral and/or developmental issues as well as their communication skills, among other best practices trainings. The work on this pilot grant will provide the basis for an application for a larger research grant.
