A Semiprivate Room, book ms. My manuscript begins with the figure of the classroom as a space of "semiprivate" encounters and argues that the semiprivate can serve as a model for public discourse that challenges both the rubric of the "public sphere" and the meaning of the claim that "the personal is the political." I argue that feminist theory has both disclosed and developed semiprivate spaces and idioms in its inquiries concerning pedagogy, the "personal criticism," stand-point epistemologies and the relations among knowledge, power, gender and seduction.

Special Issue of *differences*: What's the Difference? The Question of Theory. (A special issue, co-edited with Elizabeth Weed to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the journal, in press.)

Special Volume of *NOVEL*: *Theories of the Novel Now*.
